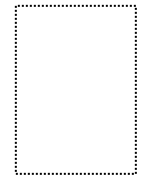
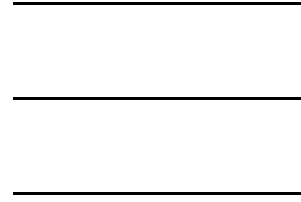

Biographies

David S. Floyd, is the current Chapter Chair and former Vice Chair, Operations. Mr. Floyd has 25 years combined logistics engineering experience supporting the U.S. Navy. Five of those years were on active duty as a Surface Warfare Officer where he served on a Cruiser and Destroyer. 20 of those years have been as a DoD support contractor and 17 years have been as a Naval Reservist. Dave is employed by Columbia Research Corporation in support of the CVN 77 Aircraft Carrier acquisition program at NAVSEA. His previous position was as a Principle Logistician at Technology, Management and Analysis (TMA) Corporation. In this capacity, he directed TMA logistics and configuration management support to the U.S. Navy LPD 17 Amphibious Transport Dock Ship Program (PMS 317). His responsibilities included acquisition and life cycle support ILS for the LPD 17 Class ships. Prior to this he directed TMA's West Coast Operations in support of the Naval Surface Warfare Center Division at Port Hueneme, CA. In this capacity, he managed TMA's AEGIS Logistics contract for Surface Combatant Combat Systems. Mr. Floyd holds a B.S. Degree in Government and Foreign Affairs from the University of Virginia and an M.S. Degree in Systems Engineering from George Mason University. He has been a member of the International Society of Logistics (SOLE) and the American Society of Naval Engineers (ASNE) since 1988. He has served as the Vice Chair Administration for the Ventura County SOLE Chapter of SOLE. He has also served four years on the Board of Directors for SOLE District's 2 Mid- Atlantic Log Committee as the Publicity Chair. Mr. Floyd received the SOLE Field Award for Configuration Management at SOLE 2002 at the annual symposium. Mr. Floyd lives

in Alexandria, VA and has a 19-year old daughter Jessica in College at U. Delaware.

Joyce McCallister, CPL is the current Vice Chair - Programs. In that capacity she will oversee chapter programs development, speakers, awards, and the hospitality/social program. Joyce is a retired Marine Corps lieutenant colonel with extensive experience in integrated logistics support, life cycle management, program management, inventory/supply management, budgeting and programming, and technical writing. She spent four years at the Naval Air System Command as Assistant Program Manager for Logistics, Navy Unmanned Aerial Vehicles and Assistant Program Manager for Logistics, H-1 Upgrade Program. As a fleet Marine, she spent eleven years as an aviation supply officer and aviation logistician. She is a certified professional logistician (CPL), project management professional (PMP), and DAWIA level III certified in acquisition logistics and program management and Level II certified in systems engineering and test & evaluation. She holds a masters of science in defense systems acquisition management from the Naval postgraduate School and a bachelors of science in chemistry from the US Naval Academy. She is married to Mr. Frank McCallister. They have two sons: Brendan and Conlan.

B.J. Silvey, CPL is a current Executive Board Member and former District Director . B.J. served for over 31 years in US Army Quartermaster Corps, both in the active and reserve components, and retired as a Colonel. He has had extensive experience in logistics operations, supply, transportation and services management. His decorations include the Legion of Merit, Meritorious Service Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster, Bronze Star Medal, and Vietnamese Honor Medal, First Class. In his civilian career, he worked with industry and Government on Navy submarine and surface sonar and mine countermeasures systems. He was ILS Manager for

the MK50 Torpedo from development through production and introduction. Subsequently, he was Director of Logistics, USW Combat Systems. He retired in September 1999. Recently, he was Chairman of Mid-Atlantic Logistics Conference 2000, sponsored by District Two, SOLE. He is a Senior Member of SOLE, a Certified Materiel Professional, a Member of Navy Acquisition Corps, and is DAWIA Level 3 in Logistics and Program Management. He has a BA in Secondary Education from Indiana University of Pennsylvania and an MA in Political Science from University of Maryland. He is a Graduate of the Army Command and General Staff College and the Army War College. He is an avid cyclist, BSA Commissioner, and serves on the Board of Directors of Reston Interfaith, the Board of Friends of the W&OD Trail and the Reston Triathlon Committee. BJ was awarded the SOLE Community Service Award in 2003.

Michael D. Connor, is the current VC-Operations and former Vice Chair (VC) - Administration. Mr. Connor has over 23 years of logistics experience in both the military and military contracting arena. Mike spent 12 years on active duty as an Armor Army Officer. This took him to The Federal Republic of Germany from 1982-1989 and Fort Devens, MA from 1989-1992. After leaving active duty, Mr. Connor moved to Washington, DC. There he began work as a logistics analyst with Logicon. This included travel to Germany, the Republic of South Korea along with several locations in the U.S. At Logicon, Mike provided systems engineering and technical assistance to the All Source Analysis System (ASAS) Program Office. In 1996, Mike accepted a position with MPRI and left for Bosnia-Herzegovina (BiH) under the auspices of the "Train and Equip" mission. He spent three years in BiH where he oversaw the arrival, transshipment, and storage of

materiel donated to BiH. He also assisted in the subsequent distribution of same equipment to units of the BiH military. Lastly, he spearheaded a comprehensive inspection of all logistics organizations in the BiH military. Mr. Connor recently left a position at the Headquarters, Army Materiel Command as a Senior Logistics Analyst specializing in Performance-Based Logistics (PBL), Total Life Cycle Systems Management (TLCSM), and Force-Centric Logistics Enterprise (FLE). He currently works PBL, TLCSM, and FLE at the Assistant Secretary of the Army for Acquisition, Logistics, and Technology (ASA(ALT)). He has been a member of SOLE since 1993 and served as the GWAC SOLE Chapter Chair for the SOLE'96 Symposium.

Gary Glick, CPL, is the current Vice Chair-Technical and Professional Development. Gary came to the Washington area defense contracting community in 1978 after five years in surface ships taught him that everything comes down to logistics. In his first job at Northrop Services, a particularly enthusiastic mentor named Charlie Hymers introduced him to the world of professional engineering services and integrated logistics support. At Northrop Services, and later at ORI, Mr. Glick helped work out the maintenance and material support needs of the TRIDENT submarine, and went on to work logistics and life cycle cost for ships, aircraft, missiles, satellite communications, and finally Ballistic Missile Defense. His logistics experience spans every level, "from a classified depth to a classified altitude." Mr. Glick currently works on Cost and Operational Performance Trades for the evolving international Joint Strike Fighter program. Mr. Glick has been a member of the Society of Logistics Engineers since 1978, and has been active the Greater Washington Area Chapter since 1989 as CPL coordinator, Board member, and chairman of the Systems Management Track at the 1996 International symposium.

Mary E. Johnston is the current Vice Chair--Administration. Mary is a career logistician with over 28 years of experience in a variety of logistics related areas. She served in the USAF as an aircraft maintenance officer on F-111E's, F-106's, F-4E's, F-15 C&D's and the T-33's. Mary served on active duty for 9 years before relocating to St Louis to work for McDonnell-Douglas. She left St Louis and moved to the Washington DC area in the early 90's and has worked for a number of local contractors since then. SUPPLY CHAIN/PERFORMANCE-BASED LOGISTICS TASK GROUP Report FY03-4

Recommendations related to the continued implementation of performance-Based Logistics (PBL) in the Department of Defense

[Second and last in a series of articles extracted from the *Defense Business Practice Implementation Board Report to the Senior Executive Council*, Department of Defense, dated October 15, 2003]

RECOMMENDATIONS

The Task Group developed 6 broad recommendations. Each recommendation seeks to strengthen DoD's ability to implement effective PBL:

1. Pursue PBL aggressively.

Performance-based logistics is an industry best practice and a DoD best practice. DoD should consider using it for all its weapons, new and legacy, provided that it is supported by a business-case analysis.

2. Issue standard guidance.

USD(AT&L) should issue guidance calling for the services to take a consistent approach to PBL. The guidance should mandate a Business Case Analysis (BCA). The BCA should determine whether PBL is an economical approach for a particular weapon system. It also should determine if PBL is applicable to the weapon system, including assessing the effects of PBL on deployability. The BCA may determine PBL is viable only for components of the weapon system.

The guidance also should allow the PBL contractor to pick the consumable item manager (organic or private) that, consis-

tent with industry practices, permits the prime vendor to select its subcontractors.

3. Reform program financial and contract management.

Move toward a single manager. In their role as military COOs, combat commanders should retain authority over funding. However, once they have allocated funding for weapons using PBL, the funds should be executed by a single manager – presumably the weapon's program manager. Unitary control over execution provides greater accountability.

Seek funding flexibility and multi-year authority. In industry, there is only one "color of money" (green). Government PBL managers need the flexibility to use various appropriations (e.g. procurement and operation and maintenance) interchangeably as needs demand. The best way to garner increased flexibility is to continue to ask Congress for substantial increases in the amount of money that can be reprogrammed among appropriations without Congressional approval.

In industry, multi-year PBL contracts that span three to five years or more

are the norm. The Administration should continue to ask Congress for authority to enter into multi-year contracts. To buttress their case for these requests in Congress, OUSD (AT&L) should take responsibility for preparing several case studies that demonstrate the importance of both reprogramming and multi-year authority.

4. Leverage the Defense Acquisition University (DAU) and other organizational

knowledge/education to accelerate PBL implementation.

Create a PBL 'Center of Excellence' at DAU. Build a database/repository of templates for Business Case Analyses (BCA), Statements

of Work (SOW), some example contracts, “how-tos” related to funding issues, etc, all to prevent reinvention of the wheel across Services and to help drive standardization.

Explore ways to partner with industry and capitalize on industry’s willingness to share lessons learned. Use Navy/Boeing Pax River joint contracting training as a benchmark.

Create exportable teams in the Services at the Systems Command (NAVAIR, NAVICP)/Major Command level to augment/assist PM offices with BCA, SOW, contract development. These teams would specialize in contracting, logistics, finance, or perhaps be cross-functional, to address variable experience at each location in developing BCAs, SOW, contracts, working with Federal Acquisition Regulation Part 12, etc. The teams would provide rapid assistance and augment the program office (unlike an audit function). The teams should be composed to ensure consistency of results across locations visited. Finally, DAU “resident experts” could also be sent out on visits to PM offices along with these teams to augment the teams and to keep current on issues in the field.

5. Increase exposure to private sector practices.

Expand Air Force’s “Education With Industry” beyond Air Force parameters. This program is currently used primarily for Air Force company grade officers. It should be expanded to include other Services and civilians. Additionally, the program should be broadened to include more industry experiences that would benefit the logistics career field (current emphasis within the Air Force is believed to be primarily information technology industries).

Leverage Defense Corporate Fellows Program to include supply chain assignments. Use a modified Defense Corporate Fellows

program to expose DoD officials to industries with high PBL and logistics content (1 year tour, Professional Military Education credit, logistics industry focus, include case studies). The target audience should be senior 0-5 and junior 0-6 military personnel on track to become PMs. Also create an equivalent for civilian personnel grades GS-13, 14 on track to become PMs.

6. Change structure/culture of PM Offices

Create a central “Log Provider” entity to coordinate all logistics activity for the PM. USD (AT&L) should consider the creation of a central “Log Provider” entity to coordinate all the logistics activity for the Program manager. CNF, a General Motors-owned joint venture supply chain entity, could provide a reasonable industry benchmark for this concept.

Streamline Program Management Offices, based on the model of the F-117 and Future Combat System (FCS) PMOs. The Task Group received a brief by OSD AT&L on a model for streamlining the PMO. The successful streamlining of the F-117 and FCS were based on this model. The brief proposed that the following items be considered core: Program Management, Financial Management, Contracting, Testing and that industry had in increasing ability to provide the remaining key PMO functions (Engineering, Logistics, Configuration Management and Subcontract Management). The consensus of the Task Group was that the streamlining model needed to be pursued further by DoD. Additionally, the Task Group felt that DoD should develop a methodology based on the model to apply to existing and future Program Offices and that the model consider such things as the maturity of the program, impact to career field sustainment, etc.

Review PM Offices for applicability of a civilian PM. Identify easy opportunities for conversion to a civilian PM by capability area. For example, the designation of a civilian PM in Combat Support, Command & Control, or IT might be more broadly accepted by the Services as it avoids conflicting with the bias for having a “warfighter” manage a major weapon systems.

Specify tenure for Deputy PM for Logistics. Tenure should be equal to that

of the PM and rotation cycles should provide for continuity in the program.

Enforce congressional mandate to keep military PMs in place 4 years. The problems caused by frequent turnover could be exacerbated in a PBL environment based on the long-term relationship with a vendor. Frequent rotation results in knowledge loss (primarily in PM office) between program start and program fielding. Some systems are in development and test 10 years before its support phase. This could equate to about 4-5 PMs over the early lifecycle of a program. Recommend that Services be made to comply with legislation or convert PM to civilian.

[POST-MAL 2004 BoD MEETING](#)

A post-MAL BoD Meeting was held on 15 May 2004 at SOLE Headquarters. The first two and a half hours of the meeting consisted of discussions with Sarah James, the Executive Director of SOLE and Barry Levine, SOLE’s legal counsel. In short, Barry gave the MAL BoD members an overview of the Sarbanes-Oxley Act and its impact on non-profit organizations including SOLE. Sarah discussed the impact on MAL which she described as an unincorporated business association make up of Chapters legally created by and chartered by SOLE. She said MAL needs to work closely with SOLE Hq to manage liability risk particularly in the negotiation of hotel and conference contracts. Sarah made several excellent recommendations and will work with Pat D’Allosta (MAL Chair) and the Woodlands in restructuring our contract through 2007 to reduce our liability. I was highly impressed with the spirit of cooperation afforded by Sarah and Pat.

Other Feedback on MAL: Workshop attendance was down from last year (38 down from 42) — Pat D’Allosta would like to make it a two-track workshop in 2005 by combining it with the “Discovery Zone” track to increase attendance. Bruce Sundermann, CPL, will not be returning as the Finance Chair next year but his relief has been identified. Bill Horne will not be returning as the Exhibits Chair and his relief has not been identified. Due to the increased overall conference attendance, the doubling of the number of Exhibitors and measures taken to reduce costs from last year, the total amount available for shared distribution to the District 2 Chapters, the District 2 Chair and SOLE Hq amounts to \$14,000. The final chapter distribution amount will depend upon a number of considerations including which District 2 Chapters are in good standing.

Mr. Wygonik received his B.S. Degree in Packaging from Michigan State University and his M.S. Degree in Manufacturing Systems Engineering from the University of St. Thomas in St. Paul, Minnesota. Sarah R. Ms. Sarah R. James joined SOLE in 1983. 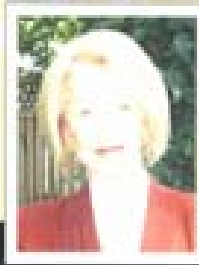
