In this article, Leslie Hansen Harps discusses how to change existing processes and incorporate new technology to make a business more efficient and viable.

Senior Logistician

The candidate will be responsible for Performance Based Logistics (PBL) business development and providing subsequent assistance to clients in developing and implementing PBL strategies. Typical tasks include: Supportability Business Case Analysis including PBL as an option. Facilitate DoD - Commercial logistics support agreements. In general, the candidate will provide strategic and implementation support for Integrated Logistics Support (ILS).

Working knowledge of the FAR and the Integrated Defense Acquisition, Technology & Logistics Life Cycle Management Framework required. Process engineering background a plus. Should have a strong background in maintenance and / or inventory planning for complex systems. Commercial, especially defense contractor, experience developing and supporting Performance based agreements is preferred. Financial Business Case Analysis (BCA) review and/or development is a plus.

Senior Logistics Engineer

Lead logistics engineering activities throughout all phases of systems acquisition. DOD UNIQUE IDENTIFICATION (UID) PROGRAM OFFICE ANNOUNCES UPCOMING UID TRAINING

The Office of the Under Secretary of Defense for Acquisition, Technology & Logistics, UID Program Office, announced that they will sponsor three UID Forums in 2006 to provide practical guidance to military program managers and DoD contractors to support the successful implementation of UID as required by DoD policy (DFARS 211.274).

Item Unique Identification (IUID) is a cornerstone of the Department of Defense's business transformation efforts and is one element of the overall DoD strategic imperative for unique identification. The requirement to uniquely identify items applies to domestic and foreign contractors providing deliverables to DoD throughout the supply chain. A comprehensive registry of marked items will provide accurate and accessible information about personal property that will make acquisition, repair, and deployment of items faster and more efficient within the Defense Supply Chain.

If you need practical guidance to understand the compliance procedures for IUID implementation, the UID Forum is your official platform! The Forums are geared for personnel from military programs and the DoD supplier base who are actively seeking to acquire the technology and systems to help them comply with the DoD UID Policy.

Mr. Rick Burnham described the DMSMS process from a Program Management perspective as follows:

1. Monitor: Assess configuration for obsolescence
2. Identify: Use all available means of DMS notifications
3. Evaluate: Assess the case for the appropriate resolution path
4. Select: Make selection based on best value
5. Implement: Perform acceptability testing/verification
6. Close: Remove from active issues list.

Mr. Burnham cited success in the use of the NAUTILUS model as a tool for coming up with cost effective and low risk solutions to obsolescence issues. For instance, when bridge buys are needed, the NAUTILUS tool can be used to compute the amount of required assets, initiate the necessary bridge buy, and ensure that backorders do not exist during the operational support period. NAUTILUS also has a vast communications network that leverages the commonality between OEM components and enables the OEMs to be aware of budget constraints.

In addition to the keynote presentations, there were an additional 21 speakers and 15 Booth Exhibitors. The total attendance was over 200 on the first day of the Conference when the approximately 75 Army and Marine School students are included. A Professional Development Workshop on Performance Based Logistics and Diminishing Manufacturing Sources and Material Shortages was held on the day before the two-day Conference.

Dr. Gansler spoke about current DoD Acquisition issues and the need for transformation, for instance

- High, and growing unit costs need lower costs (but high-quality systems)
- Long product-realization cycles need to shift to “spiral development”
- Non-state-of-the-art, ineffective business systems need to move to open-systems and enterprise-wide integration
- Non-state-of-the-art and very expensive logistics requires a “logistics transformation”

He said that all four Acquisition Reforms are interrelated and urgently required.

Mr. John Hall stated the AT&L Goals:

- Goal 1 - High Performing, Agile and Ethical Workforce
- Goal 2 - Strategic and Tactical Acquisition Excellence
- Goal 3 - Focused Technology to Meet Warfighting Needs
- *Goal 4 - Cost-effective Joint Logistics Support for the Warfighter*
- Goal 5 - Reliable and Cost-effective Industrial Capabilities Sufficient to Meet Strategic Objectives
- Goal 6 - Improved Governance and Decision Processes

Directions to Dave’s house

Metro: Take the Yellow or Blue line to King Street Metro Station. Exit the Metro Station and head west on King Street toward the George Washington Masonic Temple on the hill. Cross the street to the right at the intersection onto Russell Road and walk north three and a half blocks to the white brick house shown on right.

Driving: From 395, take the South Glebe Road Exit, veer right at the light and cross four mile run. Go about 3/4 miles until you get to the Russell Road intersection/traffic light and turn right. Dave’s white brick house is about a mile and a half up the road on the left hand side.
